Veteran's Day 2003

LAST FRIDAY – November 7

It was wet, cold, and crowded, but we had a good turnout for our weekly Rotary meeting. President Turner Cariker rang the bell to start the ball rolling. Second-stringer Raymond Blasingame said the prayer; Bruce Lampert led the singing; our prexy led in the Pledge of Allegiance; and rookie Sam Sloane did a great job of introducing guests.

Friendly Fred Lee Hughes had the winning number in Dealing for dollars, but as quickly as he received the ten bucks he said “put ‘em back in the pot.” (Thanks, Fred; we need all we can get!) There is now \$401 in the pot.

The board of directors was to meet after the program. It is that time of year where the board appoints a nominating committee to select candidates for director positions.

President Turner then gave a short report on the Flag Project. He expressed thanks to Burl Harris for providing a place (and a special drill) to assembly the flag poles and receptacles where the flags will be placed. Thanks were expressed to Joe Sconiers, Frank and Beth Dlugas, Myra Rainey, and Peter Agnell for their work in putting the flags together.

Rotarians were asked to pick up their flags after the meeting, or at Joe Sconiers’ office. If Rotarians did not want to pick up their flags, then Rotarians and other volunteers will place the flags at their home on Veteran’s Day, November 11th.

Fifty flags are ready to go! But, the president said there would be more available. He stressed that the project is to help in eventually lowering club dues. If more flags are sold, then perhaps the club will also have additional funds to help with our community service projects.

Chairperson for the day was Sandi Hugg who introduced speaker Joe Marshall. Joe came from Roswell, New Mexico. He has served in the military and has three degrees – two are from Hardin-Simmons University and Abilene Christian. Joe is active in Kiwanis and has served as a District Governor. Joe

and his wife have three adult children. Dr. Joe is semi-retired and is a professor at Abilene Christian. His topic for the day was Western Movies.

The speaker started out by saying that this year is the 100th year anniversary of the movie, The Great Train Robbery. This film marked the beginning of the motion pictures. This was a silent movie and there was no main hero or star.

The first actor to be considered a main star or a central character in a movie was Frank Billie Anderson. He was in the movies from 1908 to 1917. The speaker said that we, the audience, like to identify ourselves with a main character. He said that is why we like actors like Hopalong Cassidy and Buck Jones.

Dr. Marshall gave a brief history of old time cowboy movie stars, which began in 1930 and ended in 1953. He mentioned Tom Mix who was in movies from 1917 to 1930’s. He said this old cowboy was a big gambler, wore fancy clothes, and was a world champion cowboy rider. After winning \$7,500 in a card game in Arizona this popular Western Cowboy was killed in an automobile accident. His winnings had been paid in silver dollars, and the speaker believes the suitcase with this heavy load hit him in the neck as his car slid down a bridge.

Of course John Wayne was mentioned. The speaker said, “You will never find another John Wayne.” John Wayne, America’s hero was in 48 Westerns.

Other cowboys the speaker talked about were the following: Ken Maynard, Smiley Burnett, the Cisco Kid, Johnny Mack Brown, Gene Autry, Roy Rogers, Buck Jones, Tim McCoy, Tex Ritter (from Texas), Sunset Carson, Wild Bill Elliott, Bob Baker, Tim Holt, Allen Rocky Lane, Rex Allen, Lash Larue, and Bob Steele.

Of all the actors in Cowboy movies, the speaker signaled out Buck Jones as an excellent role model. Dr. Marshall said Buck Jones did not smoke, drink, or curse. He was kind to women and children. Now, that is the role model that we need in Rotary and around the world!

Thanks, Sandi, for bringing Dr. Marshall our way. It was good for Rotarians to remember the “good old days with all those old cowboys.”

“El Presidente” Turner ended the meeting by leading Rotarians in the Four Way Test.



Blane Community Immunization Grants

Thanks to childhood immunizations, the United States has virtually eliminated polio and measles and all but wiped out meningitis, mumps, pertussis, tetanus, and rubella – diseases that killed and disabled tens of thousands of people only a generation ago.

But vaccine-preventable infectious diseases remain killers on a huge scale worldwide. Through travel and immigration, these diseases can easily reenter the U.S. population – if residents become complacent and forego immunizations.

Many diseases continue to take an unnecessarily large toll in the United States. Influenza and related complications, for example, cause 20,000 to 40,000 deaths a year, mainly among the elderly and very young.

In response to this ongoing need for improved immunization, The Rotary Foundation Blane Community Immunization Grants provide up to \$1,000 in matching funds to U.S. Rotary clubs to help

them improve immunization levels in their communities. The grants are intended for new projects in the USA, undertaken by Rotarians together with other community groups, which address immunization needs of underserved people of all ages.

The grants are the result of a generous gift by Jack Blane, past governor of RI District 6440, and his wife, Joan. For decades, Jack Blane has worked tirelessly for immunization. Former chairman of the USA National PolioPlus Committee, he currently chairs the Immunization, Education and Action Committee of Healthy Mothers, Healthy Babies, a national coalition to which Rotary International belongs.

Only U.S. Rotary Clubs may apply for a Blane Community Immunization Grant and clubs must form a community coalition to meet immunization needs.

Our board of directors approved applying for one of these Grants and partnering with the Abilene Medical Care Mission. Rotarian Scott Golding, also with the Medical Care Mission, has agreed to chair this project.

How can you help?

As we approach the year's end, many will want to make charitable donations to help those less fortunate. Please consider donating \$100 (or more) towards this project. Our goal is \$1,000 with a \$1,000 match from R.I. for a total of \$2,000 for the Medical Care Mission.

The donation and the match from R.I. will count towards a Rotarian's Paul Harris Fellow Sustaining Membership. So, this is your chance to get credit for \$200 when you donate \$100!

The Women of Rotary have already made a generous contribution of \$200 towards this project in our club's name.

Just for clarification, this would be a "new" donation. Your pledge payment, pledged last year for PolioPlus, is still for the PolioPlus Campaign. Reminder statements for those pledge are being sent this month.



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

LAST FRIDAY – November 14

Well, it was very appropriate for the tough Marine to ring the bell to get things going relating to our U.S. military men and women. Bob Kuykendall said the prayer in which he asked for the health of Don Etter. Pinch hitter, Joel Wilson led the singing; and the prexy Marine led in the pledge to Old Glory. Dependable Michael Burke came through to introduce guests.

President Turner said 48 Rotarians had purchased flags; and, that 48 flags were placed in homes on Veteran's Day, November 11. With a little humor, he said Rotarians picked up more than 48 at the end of the day, so he assumed the Lions must have lost some! Again, the president expressed his thanks to all Rotarians who are participating in this worthwhile project.

The Rotarians with a birthday in November were recognized. Rotarians said "Happy Birthday" to Marty Pothier, the lone ranger present.

Scott Golding made an announcement regarding an immunization program. He is the chairman and will be looking for contributions. RI will match whatever amount the local club raises (up to \$1,000). This project is called the Blane Immunization Program and you can read about it in The Rotater.

Michael Burke was the lucky winner in dealing for dollars. Joe Sconiers said there were 69 tickets sold and that the pot is now up to \$465.00.

The president recognized Mike Weber as Rotarian of the week. The president said some nice things about this young Rotarian.

"Mr., Aggie", Fred Lee Hughes, was the chairman of the day. There are very few Rotarians who can preside with a sense of humor and dignity like Fred Lee. The former rotary president said today's program was to honor all military personnel in conjunction with Veteran's Day. Fred Lee said there are about 25,000,000 living veterans. He said about Veteran's Day: "It is a time to celebrate life and demonstrate love of country." With a little humor, Fred Lee said regarding a bumper sticker, which read: "If you can read this, thank a teacher. If you can read it in English, thank a veteran!"

The chairman recognized those Rotarians who had served in World War II, Korean War, Vietnam, and Dessert Storm. Paul Ruska, absent for the day, was recognized as a former prisoner of war.

Fred Lee introduced three Veterans who related some of their experiences curing their time of service. The

three Rotarians were Malcolm Coco, Oris Greever and Durward Young.

Space does not permit to relate all these three great stories from these men. In brief:

Malcolm Coco is a retired Air Force Lt. Col. With 22 years of service. His military career started in Big Spring, Texas in 1969 for flying training and then a one-year tour in Viet Nam beginning in 1969.

Malcolm said: "WWII was, as you know, a totally different war than Viet Nam. So, to keep this all in perspective, my experience, compared to our WWII veterans, was a cakewalk. Therefore, I salute and admire our WWII veterans and thank them for their service."

Oris Greever said: "During WWII people were very patriotic, with emphasis on Mom, Apple Pie and Flag, or to use another term, they were "Gung Ho." I was too young for the real fighting, but as the war was ending I was eager to serve. I became a Marine at the age of 17 years old and 133 pounds!

"After Boot Camp I was sent to El Toro, MCAS and assigned to VMF 214, a Marine Fighter Squadron better known as the "Black Sheep." We went from there to an aircraft carrier and set sail from North Island in San Diego on Friday the 13th for the South Pacific. A group of us really bonded and 58 years later with only three of us still alive, we have semi-annual reunions to share each others good and bad times like a family."

Durward Young began by saying that at the age of 8 in Stamford, Texas, he could see two movies for 10 cents that lasted 4 hours; and afterwards he could buy a double dip ice cream for a nickel! Now that was living. Durward said that in June of 1943 his life changed forever. For two years this quiet Rotarian served Uncle Sam in Europe.

Durward talked about the rough training he went through. He talked about 25 mile hikes. And he mentioned all those injections soldiers must take. The hard training paid off as he took part in Normandy invasion and he shared how close to death he came at times.

Our hats are off to these men for sharing their stories. This writer would encourage all military people to write their stories – it will be good for family members.

Rotarian Oris shared these words at the end of his talk:

"It is the soldier, not the reporter, who has given us freedom of the press.

It is the soldier, not the poet, who has given us freedom of speech.

It is the soldier, not the campus organizer, who has given us the freedom to demonstrate.

It is the soldier who salutes the flag, who serves beneath the flag, and whose coffin is draped by the flag, who allows the protester to burn the flag.”



We ended by reciting the Rotary Four Way Test.

Club Website



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
